BANBURY SAILING CLUB Sailing Instructions Topper Midlands Traveller at Boddington Reservoir 18th February 2023

1 RULES

1.1 The event is governed by the rules as defined in the Racing Rules of Sailing 2021-2024.1.2 The Sailing instructions may also change rules. In the event of there being any conflict between the aforementioned and these sailing instructions, these sailing instructions will take precedence at all times.

1.3 Competitors shall sail in accordance with the RYA Racing charter.

1.4 Topper class rules will apply as standard.

1.5 All competitors are required to wear personal floatation devices while afloat and on club pontoons

2 Notice to Competitors

2.1 Any further Notices to competitors will be posted on the club notice board

3 Changes to Sailing Instructions

3.1 Any changes in the sailing instructions will be posted no later than 30 minutes before the advertised starting time of the race or races concerned. These changes will be valid for all subsequent races in the series.

3.2 Changes in the Sailing Instructions will be displayed at the clubhouse and will be signalled by displaying flag "L" from the flagpole. When no further changes have been made Flag "L" will be lowered after the start of the last race of that day.

4 Signals made Ashore

4.1 Signals made ashore will be hoisted on the flagpole located to the south of the main entrance to the clubhouse

4.2 When flag AP is displayed ashore "1 minute" is replaced with "not less than 30 minutes" in race signal AP.

5 Schedule of Races

5.1 The race times are scheduled to be as follows:-

- Briefing Club briefing approximately 10.00 am
- Four races are scheduled and all reasonable attempts will be made to complete all 4 races.
- First race 10.30am Start
- Race 2, to follow back to back
- A short break for lunch
- Races 3 and 4 will be sailed back to back

6 Class Flag Signals

6.1 The class flag will be the Topper class Flag.



6.2 In the event that this flag is not available, Flag T will be used.

7 Racing Area

7.1 The location of the racing area will be provided at the briefing by the Race Officer.

8 The Courses

8.1 The course marks will be spherical orange buoys labelled 1-8.

8.2 The course will be set by the Race Officer on the day and displayed on the side of the committee boat and the course board by the access steps. Should these be different, the course on the side of the committee boat will take precedence. The course may be changed between races and will be displayed on the side of the committee boat before the first warning signal of the next race.

8.3 When the letter "L" is displayed on the course board, boats will pass between the committee boat and the end of line mark on each lap.

8.4 In the event that the course displayed is changed prior to a race starting, the Race Officer may indicate this by flying flag C from the committee boat mast.

8.5 The Race Officer will disqualify boats seen by the race team to have sailed the wrong course, including missing the line when set as part of the course.

8.6 There may be a lead boat for each race, who will display the 'Follow me' flag, to be indicated at the briefing. However this boat will also provide safety cover and its priority will be to deliver safety cover, the 'Follow me' flag will be lowered in this event. It will be the discretion of the Race Officer if a lead boat is provided. The lead boat will be withdrawn at the end of the first lap of every race.

9 Number of Laps

9.1 The number of laps will be displayed on the course board by the access steps to the clubhouse. Each race will last for approximately 40 to 45 minutes.

10 The Start

10.1 Races will be started by the warning signal given 5 minutes before the start signal. The sequence will follow 5, 4, 1 - Go.

10.2 The start line is defined as the line between the mast displaying an Orange flag on the committee boat and an end of line mark, a large orange cylindrical buoy.

10.3 Boats whose warning signal has not been made shall avoid the start area.

10.4 A boat starting later than 4mins.after her start will be scored DNS.

10.5 A race may not be started if, in the opinion of the Race Officer, there is insufficient or excessive wind.

11 Recalls

11.1 Individual recalls will be signalled by the Race Officer

11.2 If after a General Recall the Race Officer deems necessary RSS 30.3 will apply - the Black Flag Rule. If a black flag has been displayed, no part of a boat's hull, crew or equipment shall be in the triangle formed by the ends of the starting line and the first mark during the last minute before her starting signal. If a boat breaks this rule and is identified, she shall be disqualified without a hearing, even if the race is restarted or re-sailed. The Race Officer shall display her sail number or championship number, before the next warning signal for that race, and if the race is restarted or re-sailed she shall not sail in it.

12 Change of Position of the Next Mark

12.1 It may be necessary to change the position of the next mark, the Race Officer may move the original mark to a new position. If significant, the change will be signalled before the leading boat has begun the new leg, although the mark may not yet be in its new position. The direction it has been / will be moved to will be signalled by the boat at the previous mark showing red for movement to port and green for movement to Starboard. Any mark to be rounded after rounding the moved mark may be relocated without further signalling to maintain course configuration.

13 Shortening Course

13.1 The Race Officer may deem the race to be shortened and will display a shortened course flag on the committee boat followed by two sound signals.

14 The Finish

14.1 The finish line will be between the mast displaying a blue flag on the committee boat, and the end of line marker or other mark of the course

14.2 The Race Officer shall plan to finish slower boats as close to the leading boats finish time as possible. This may necessitate finishing individual boats without shortening the course for the entire fleet. The Race Officer and their assistants will notify the competitors that they have finished by verbal communication and displaying the Whisky flag, there will be no visual or sound signal. This is known as a Race Officers discretionary finish. The Race Officers decision is final and is not grounds for redress.

15 Time Limit

15.1 Time limits are set by the race officers discretion.

- First Mark time limit 20 minutes
- Race Target time 45 minutes
- Finishing window time limit 20 minutes

16 Protests and Requests for Redress

16.1 Protests shall be written on forms available at the race control desk and delivered there within 30 minutes of the last boat finishing the race, or if races are sailed "back to back" within 30 minutes of the finish of the last of the "back to back" races.

16.2 Protest hearings will commence as soon as possible thereafter racing has completed. The protests to be heard will be posted on the notice board at the end of the protest time limit.

17 Scoring

17.1 One races shall constitute an event

17.2 If 3 races or fewer have been completed, a boats score shall be the total of her race scores

17.3 If more than 3 races have been completed a boats score shall be her total race scores excluding her worst score as discard.

17.4 All rigs (5.3 and 4.2) will be scored as a single fleet.

18 Safety Regulations

18.1 All competitors are required to wear personal floatation devices while afloat and on club pontoons.

18.2 Neither a wet suit or a dry suit constitute adequate personal buoyancy

18.3 It is not permitted to land outside of the club enclosure except in an emergency.

18.4 When the race committee considers that a boat or competitor is in difficulty it may instruct the boat or competitor to accept outside help, retire or sail ashore.

19 Declarations

19.1 Signing on before each race will not be necessary although it will be necessary to have entered the series to be eligible to start a race.

19.2 A declaration sheet will be displayed near the official notice board which must be signed within 30 minutes of the last boat finishing in each race (or after the final race if all races are sailed back to back) ONLY by competitors who have retired.

20 Equipment and Measurement Checks

20.1 Boats may be measured before or after any race at the discretion of the Class or Race Committee.

21 Coaching and Support teams

21.1 In accordance with the overall principles of Rule 41(c) and (d), an ITCA provided coach will be on the water in an additional power boat to assist less experienced sailors during each race. The power boat crew may offer advice to competitors in the race who need help to overcome a manifest problem or improve their sailing performance at the time. The coach will adhere to coaching principles and behaviours as required under Rule 2, Fair Sailing

21.2 No other support teams will be allowed on the water.

22 Outside Help

22.1 Rescue crews are permitted to assist helms who are struggling to right their boat after a capsize. The crew will stand by until it is apparent that assistance is required and then assist in righting the vessel. Helms may then continue to race as the capsize is viewed as sufficient penalty. The rescue crew will attend and assist in the order that they see the vessels capsize. This changes RRS 41.

23 Disclaimer of Liability

23.1 Competitors participate in the regatta entirely at their own risk. The organizing authority will not accept any liability for material damage or personal injury or death sustained in conjunction with or prior to, during or after the regatta as detailed within the Notice of Race.

24 Insurance

24.1 Each participating boat shall be insured with a valid Third Party Liability Insurance with a minimum Cover of £3 million.

25 Trash disposal

25.1 Trash must be retained within the competitors boat and disposed in the club waste bins at the of the days racing.
